Exciting news: The Fall BIG Book Sale dates are set AND we're opening earlier on the first day to accommodate more members-only shopping.

The 2023 Fall BIG Book Sale is set for Monday, November 6 through Thursday November 9. As always, the first day, Monday, will be open to Friends members only, and is expected to include an informal reception with snacks and refreshments.

And, in response to your suggestions, the Monday sale will open two hours earlier than in past years, providing a full six and one-half hours of shopping from 1 p.m. thru 7:30 p.m. for members' enjoyment.

4. Exclusive Book Club perk - The Reading Between the Spines book club was established by the Friends as a local book discussion club open to members only. For each limited-attendance event, the club purchases the books of that title for members to read. After the in-person discussion, the books are donated to the Library for its collections.

5. Exclusive Event perks – The Friends have begun scheduling events that are only open to Friends members.

As a member, you will receive an email notice of upcoming membersonly Events and Book Club discussions as they are scheduled.

From The Library Director: East Branch Is An Enhanced Community Hub

In the wise words of Albert Einstein, "The only thing that you absolutely have to know is the location of the library." And for East siders and others who are curious, the new East Branch is now located at 2253 Main St., Green Bay.

The new Library location (in the site of the former Titletown Fitness) opened with great fanfare on Sept. 18, built with great intention to serve the ever-evolving community it serves. This long-awaited new Library branch represents the culmination of two decades of planning. The site offers almost three times as much space at 16,300 square feet, which is important. But even more important is what is housed and featured within those walls (and outdoors, too, which has an enclosed garden and patio featuring several outdoor gathering spots). The space is configured to accommodate the many populations the Library services with:

- Designated areas for all ages including varied, attractive, and comfortable seating
- An expanded and enhanced area for children and families featuring new age-appropriate toys and equipment to help build literacy and other types of skills, and a family restroom nearby
- High-speed Wi-Fi for job seekers, children doing homework online, etc.
- A fireplace
- A calming room for those who are overstimulated and need a reset
- Five reservable study rooms, each with a whiteboard and Bluetoothenabled monitor for study groups of all ages
- A 100-person meeting room that can be divided into smaller rooms and an adjacent kitchenette, plus a hearing loop for the hearing impaired, monitors, and video conferencing
- Computer access
- A business center offering a print and copy center, including faxing and scanning to email
- A drive-up window for convenient book return
- A bright, attention-getting facade that glows at night and beckons patrons day and night

The space also pays homage to the Green Bay area with art made from historic local maps from the Library's archives. And, no Library would be complete without the Library staff who bring life to the space. In the words of Timothy Healy, former president of the New York Public Library, "The most important asset of any library goes home at night – the library staff." The good news is that Brown County Library librarians and other staff return each morning, ready to open the doors, say "welcome" or "bienvenido" to patrons, and cater to their diverse learning needs. We look forward to seeing you at your new East Branch Library!

The Local History Series is making a name for itself in the history books as it hosts its 35th annual sessions for fall.



Thursday, September 14 Excavations at the Second Fort Crawford

Presented by Vicki Twinde-Javner In 1999, while monitoring for road and water main improvements,



Thursday, September 21 Research and Investigation of the Fort Howard Military Stockade Presented by Les Van Horn and Mary Jane Herber In 1852, the Fort Howard Military Post was abandoned



by the U.S. Department of War. Many of the structures were either moved or torn down, but what about the stockade? What started as a discussion over an old map has become an ongoing study about what happened to the stockade. With the work of surveyors, historians, and public land records, some of these questions were answered, including "Where exactly is Fort Howard's stockade?"

Thursday, October 5 Louis Jolliet: A Solid Path Through Water Presented by James Healy

2023 is the 350th anniversary of the expedition of Louis Jolliet and Father Jacques Marquette through Wisconsin and down the Mississippi. The trip dramatically affected the lives of both those coming to North America and those already here. Louis Jolliet: A Solid Path Through Water will offer a connection to our past and to some of the questions that still confront us.

Thursday, October 12 The Ku Klux Klan of the Fox River Valley

Presented by Michael D. Jacobs In the mid-1920s, the Ku Klux Klan (KKK) was recruiting in the area from Oshkosh to the north, including Brown County, where the population was immigrant, largely Catholic, and northern European. The Klan had more than one focus of un-American ideas – opposition of Catholics, violations of the Volstead Act (Prohibition), and the immigrant population. Learn how the KKK influence, although small, rose and fell in Northeast Wisconsin.

Thursday, October 19 The All-American Girls Professional Baseball League in Northeast Wisconsin Presented by Jeff Ash The All-American Girls Professional Baseball League was formed in 1943. In August 1944, the sport



was brought to Green Bay for a tryout. The Milwaukee Chicks were looking for a new home. Did the team make Green Bay home or did the Chicks find another community to roost in? Discover more about the different teams in the league and how long it lasted.

Friday Kicks Off The Fun

The fun begins with Pop Con[™]: School's Out! from 1 to 3 p.m. on Friday with activities, crafts, and more for youth. Kids ages 5 to 17 can show off their cosplay (the practice of dressing up as a character from a movie, book, or video game), play some games, and more. Then, starting at 7 p.m., the Library will kick off Pop Con[™] Preview with Comedic Neutral. This is a hilarious improvised Dungeons & Dragons show from ComedyCity's Comedic Neutral. Their crew will embody the characters they created and take you on an adventure like no other. Although they will make many decisions, their ultimate fate depends on the roll of the dice! This event is for ages 13 and older.

Don't-Miss Saturday Activities

Come Saturday, the whole family can get into Pop Con[™].

Dress up as your favorite superhero or pop-culture character or just hang out with fellow fans. You can enter the Cosplay Contest or try out new and favorite board games in the gameplay area with Gnome Games. Don't forget a shopping bag for when you meet and discover unique treasures from local artists and creators in the aisles of Artist Alley. You can listen to interviews and meet local authors and artists... including the opportunity to meet none other than the creator of "Goosebumps," R.L. Stine!

Stine is a popular American novelist best known for his horror books for children. His writings have been scaring people all around the



world for decades. So far, he has sold more than 400 million books and his books have been translated into 35 languages, making him one of the best-selling authors in history. Lifelong Stine readers and those new to his literary works are welcome to listen to **two interviews with Stine that will include the opportunity to ask questions and attend a signing afterwards** (limit 2 items per attendee).

- The first interview will be held at the Brown County Library Pop Con[™] at 12 p.m. on Saturday, October 7 with Dr. Bryan Carr from Bryan Carr's Serious Fun podcast at the Brown County Central Library auditorium. Dr. Bryan Carr hosts the podcast Serious Fun, where pop culture and social culture collide. Dr. Carr hosts interviews and discussions with academics, professionals, and fans from across the industry – from video games and comics to sports and music and so much more – to take a critical and comprehensive look at popular culture and our relationship with it. Dr. Carr is an Associate Professor in the Department of Communication, Information Science, Women's & Gender Studies at UW-Green Bay.
- Stine will give another interview at 4:30 p.m. on Saturday, October 7 at Washington Middle School auditorium, 314 S. Baird St., Green Bay. Doors will open at Washington Middle School at 4 p.m.

Space is limited at each interview location with a first-come, first seated procedure.

In addition, don't miss The Shake Ups, an award-winning, Midwestbased power-pop music collective that blends co-ed vocals, bouncy melodies, and infectious energy into a refreshingly charming sound. The Shake Ups have independently released several full-length albums inspired by their favorite cartoons, including Steven Universe, Voltron, My Little Pony: Friendship Is Magic, Scooby-Doo, and more. The band continues to build on its reputation as a primary force in the independent music community, bringing joy to children of all ages as well as pop culture enthusiasts and the indie music echelon.

Closing the Chapter On A Successful 2023 Summer Reading Program

The Library was an exciting and inviting destination this summer, bursting with more than 440 programs, stories, and special events as part of the Summer Reading Program. The common denominator: Building background knowledge and vocabulary, factors in reading success.

Among other things, this included:

- The newly-launched Seed Library led to several gardeningrelated programs
- The Renaissance Faire was a hit with people who donned period clothing and enjoyed a mix of history, fantasy, and arts
- Teens created zines (small magazines on any topic using a mix of mediums)
- Job seekers connected with career navigators
- Authors discussed their books
- Costume book characters delighted children

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• Professional performers entertained with music, magic, science, and comedy

The Numbers Are In!

The Library offered four Summer Reading Programs in June, July, and August. About 1,600 adults (ages 18+) signed up. One Library user commented, "Since I retired, I have read over 600 books. I'm here all the time!"

Teens and tweens (grades 6 and up) weren't far behind, with nearly 1,400 of them tracking their reading to earn prizes including water park passes, Green Bay Rockers tickets, and books of choice. We couldn't have done it without our teen volunteers who helped the librarians administer the reading program by checking readers in, distributing prizes, and performing other duties.

Children through grade 5 also recorded the time they spent reading to earn prizes and a free book. A whopping 4,500 kids maintained and/or improved their reading skills during the summer. This is so important because reading over the summer helps prevent "summer learning loss" or "summer slide" that leads a child to fall behind in their skills and return to school with a literacy deficit.

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New this year: A program for ages 0-4. The Early Literacy program integrated the five practices of reading, signing, talking, writing, and playing through fun, interactive activities that help develop language and literacy skills. The program had more than 1,500 participants and they, too, earned age-appropriate prizes as well as a book.

Altogether, there were 9,080 register summer readers. The Library was abuzz with individuals, families, summer camp groups, and others who checked out Library materials, participated in activities together, met others, and enjoyed the Library's decorated-for-summer surroundings.

The Summer Reading Program is supported by several community partners. At the top of the list is the Friends of the Brown County Library, who is a significant funder of the Summer Reading Program. Thank you, Friends, for understanding the importance of literacy, why exposure to new experiences is essential to learning, and why reading matters. The Friends know, "Kids who read, succeed!"
