## From the Editor's Desk



A common lament of retired people is that they claim to be busier in retirement than when they were working. I don't know if that's necessarily the case for me, but I do try to stay occupied. Volunteering (managing the Friends newsletter and website, plus helping the local historical society), house and cabin projects, and camper repairs all seem to consume my days.

For a bit of a mental challenge, I like to study foreign languages. When we took a trip to Italy, I learned enough Italian to get by, but in high school, college, and more recently in adult learning, I have studied German. While I have some friends in Switzerland and communicate with them on occasion, my desire to learn this language is less "applied" and more an intellectual pursuit. I enjoy the challenge of learning the rules for adjective endings and verb forms (and learning the exceptions to the rules, or when there are no rules at all!)

To me, foreign languages are like a secret code, a communication gateway into understanding a people, their culture, and their history. Every little vocabulary and grammar discovery adds a little more insight into that new world.

On the surface, literacy in German is no different than literacy in English. However, there's a big difference in having only a partial understanding of a faraway language used on an occasional basis, versus having a partial ability to read and write the language in the land where you need to live, function, learn, and advance.

The Friends are committed to the Brown County Library's mission of early learning and literacy programs for the county's children and their families. In addition to our support for Library programs, our own Born to Read and Give-A-Kid-A-Book programs put us on the forefront of childhood literacy. It's one thing for me to struggle with German, but I don't want others to have language be an impediment in their daily life. The Friends thank you, our members, donors, and supporters, for helping us with this mission.

### 2023 Is One for the Record Books

By anyone's account, Brown County Library's 2023 has been one for the record books.

#### Reading for the Future

The year began with momentum around work supporting grade-level reading proficiency, following the Reading Success Summit (pictured below) held in October 2022. Without the support of the Friends of the Brown County Library, the Summit would not have happened. However, because the Summit happened and raised the community alarm about declining youth reading proficiency in Brown County, positive community action has been taken and continues to be taken.

And this isn't solely happening at the Library, where we have been working with a consultant on the development of a multi-year strategic framework to guide our services for youth and families. Amazing, positive sparks around youth literacy have happened throughout Brown County, as caring community members and strategic leaders have found ways to contribute to this critical cause. 2024 promises increased collaborative community action to help more youth be successful readers.

### **Get Growing!**

A wonderful new collaborative initiative that sprouted in 2023 is the Brown County Seed Library (pictured below). The Seed Library is a partnership among the Library, Brown County Community Gardens Program, Green Bay Botanical Garden, New Leaf Foods, Inc., Northeastern Wisconsin Master Gardeners, UW-Green Bay and UW-Madison Extension Brown County. The Seed Library offers a curated collection of seeds – primarily edible plants – suited for success in our Northeast Wisconsin growing region. Seeds are available free to anyone interested in planting vegetables, fruits, and pollinator-friendly plants. The Seed Library launch event at Central Library in March 2023 attracted more than 700 attendees of all ages and gardening skills. Sessions on gardening presented by experts were offered not just at the launch event but at the Central Library throughout the year. The Seed Library's second season kicks off on March 2, 2024.



### Pop Con™ Featured Bestselling Author, R.L. Stine

Special support from the Friends of the Brown County Library enabled the Library to host one of the best-selling authors of all time – R.L. Stine (*seated in photo below*). As the keynote speaker of BCL's 2023 Pop Con, Stine drew fans from around the nation. In fact, one youth and his mother drove more than 10 hours to attend! The family shared with Library staff that the trip was a special birthday present for the child whose favorite author is Stine. According to the excited youth, meeting Stine and attending Pop Con was "even a better birthday than the Disney World trip!"



### **East Branch Grand Opening**



2023 happily saw the autumn opening of our long-awaited new East Branch (pictured left and below). Thanks to funding support from the Friends of the Brown County Library, a September grand opening of the new branch featured special performances, activities, refreshments, and a ribbon cutting. Almost 1,000 attendees were the first community members to enjoy the new branch Library, which offers almost triple the space

of the previous East Branch. The new branch includes meeting and study rooms, a spacious Children's Area with a Calming Room, a drive-up window, and an enclosed seasonal garden and patio. Since opening, usage of the East Branch has more than doubled, with visitors reporting the new Library has been worth the wait.

Wrapping up this extraordinary year and promising a continuation of 2023's bustling activity and action into 2024, we held a kick-off meeting in December 2023 for the design planning team for Brown County Library's new Ashwaubenon Branch.

### What's it Worth?

### Expert Mark Moran Returns to Green Bay for Antique & Collectible Appraisal Event



The East Branch Library, together with the Friends, present an antiques and collectibles appraisal event featuring author and antiques expert Mark F. Moran of Iola, Wis. on **Saturday, January 20, 2024 beginning at 11 a.m.** The public is invited to observe for free.

Moran bought and sold antiques for more than 30 years, specializing in vintage folk art, Americana, and fine art. He has been active as an appraiser of antiques and fine art for more than 20 years.

Formerly senior editor of antiques and collectibles books for Krause Publications, Moran also was a contributing editor for *Antique Trader magazine*; editor of *Antique Review East* magazine; producer of *Atlantique City*, an antiques show held in Atlantic City; and editorial director of F+W Media's Antiques Group. Moran also was a guest expert on the PBS series, "Antiques Roadshow," for nine seasons.

He is the author or co-author of more than 25 books on antiques and collectibles, including three editions of the 800-page annual "Warman's Antiques & Collectibles."

Registration for the event is required to have antiques or collectibles appraised. There is a \$15-per-item appraisal fee and a limit of three items per registrant. A portion of fees collected will benefit the Friends. Call 920-391-4600 to reserve a time slot. And if you can't

make the January event, a second What's it Worth will be held on April 20 at the Weyers-Hilliard Branch in Howard.

Note: Opinions of value are informal and may not be used for insurance or charitable donations, which require a certified appraisal.

### Categories of objects for appraisal may include:

- Fine art: including paintings, drawings, prints and statuary.
- Furniture: usually smaller pieces are best.
- Ceramics: including figural pottery, vases, dishes, kitchenware, and stoneware.
- Glassware: including lighting, marbles, and souvenir items.
- Vintage photographs: including tintypes, ambrotypes, and daguerreotypes.
- Advertising: including posters, lithographed tin, paper, and figural objects.
- Folk art: including carvings, quilts, weathervanes, windmill weights, and "outsider" art.
- Assorted toys: including dolls (bisque, composition, and plastic), wind ups, and mechanical banks.
- Metal ware: including iron, bronze, brass, pot metal, silver, silver plate.
- Clocks: including mantel, hanging, and figural.
- Costume jewelry: including brooches, bracelets, earrings.
- Antique and vintage lighting of all kinds.
- Musical instruments.
- · Sporting collectibles.
- Books.

**Excluded items:** All weapons, including swords and knives (folding knives with advertising are accepted); traps (like leg-hold); Nazi memorabilia; coins and paper money; fine jewelry, including precious gems; and Beanie Babies.

The 2023 Give-A-Kid-A-Book (GAKAB) campaign had a special reason to celebrate as it was the 35th anniversary! Each year, the program benefits from the support of sponsors, donors, and volunteers who make the dream of owning their own books a reality for so many children.

This past year's campaign was fortunate to be joined by Bre LaFleur as official spokesperson for the 2023 GAKAB campaign. This year's public service announcement with Bre was filmed at the new East Branch in October. Then on November 1, 2023, the GAKAB campaign launched with an in-person kick-off event at the Central Library where Bre shared a story about a wonderful family book tradition that the LaFleurs implemented due to all their moving around. The morning was made extra special as Kelsy Rusch, Library Media Specialist at Fort Howard Elementary School, brought some of her students to share their passion about books and heroes, adventures, and travels. We then recognized our sponsors for their amazing support of this critical program coordinated by the Friends of the Brown County Library.

The program's wonderful partnership with The Salvation Army ensured that the 2023 GAKAB campaign was better than ever. GAKAB successfully supported a record 2,422 families by sharing more than 13,500 books with more than 6,780 kids in the community. Our wonderful volunteers came sporting all kinds of holiday attire to make this year's three-day shopping event a delightful experience. The Friends can't think of a more festive way for both the parents and our volunteers to start their holiday celebrations than coming together and choosing books for kids in our community.

Throughout November and December, community members supported GAKAB by choosing books in a variety of ways. They shopped at Barnes & Noble or at Lion's Mouth Bookstore and went online to order their favorite titles from Amazon and shipped them



directly to GAKAB at the Library. Several families even donated a book or two each month over the course of the year. Hundreds of books were collected throughout the community from donation boxes placed at Library branches, Green Bay area Nicolet National Bank branches, the local YMCAs, and other organizations and businesses in the community. In addition, hundreds of people donated funds so that the GAKAB team could handle the extra need this year, and even placed a last-minute order of books to ensure that every child in the program was gifted two books this year.

The Friends and the GAKAB team believe that we are more successful when we work together, and we would extend our grateful thanks to all the people who had a hand in making 2023 a gigantic success. Our appreciation goes to The Salvation Army organization and key sponsors including Nicolet National Bank, the Green Bay Area Retired Men's Club, Green Bay Packers Give Back, the Allouez Optimist Club, the Brown County Community Women's Club, Festival Foods, and WBAY-TV2. ## Brown Pop Con™ County Library Pop Con™ Was A Rousing Success!

Thanks to the Friends of the Brown County Library, the 6th annual Pop Con was a wonderful success! More than 1,400 people descended on the Central Library on Saturday, October 7, 2023 to celebrate comics, movies, books, gaming, and of course, special guest R.L. Stine.

UW-Green Bay Professor Dr. Bryan Carr interviewed Stine in front of a maxed-out capacity crowd in the Library auditorium. Afterward he met several hundred more fans through a very popular meet-and-greet session. Stine finished the day being interviewed by Library Director Sarah Sugden at Washington Middle School to another enthusiastic crowd and autographed even more books. The excitement and joy that Stine brought to attendees was unsurpassed by any previous Pop Con guest. His appeal is truly intergenerational, and it showed with attendees ranging from babies to adults with their own families in tow.

Pop Con didn't stop with R.L. Stine; there was plenty more for attendees to enjoy. Dr. Carr offered two more podcast recordings throughout the day, including a discussion of the ongoing appeal of video games and an interview with The Shake Ups. The Shakes Ups returned for a second performance (having previously been at Pop Con in 2019) and celebrated popular cartoons through original and parody songs. Award-winning cosplayer Valerie Meacham presented on making creative costumes on a budget and for the first time, attendees could try two different role playing games, Dungeons & Dragons and Pathfinder, with volunteer dungeon masters leading their adventures.

The completion of the Central Library's new flexible meeting space allowed for a major expansion of the Artists' Alley. The number of vendors doubled and we were able to accommodate multiple local nonprofit organizations, including the Boys & Girls Club of Green Bay, Urban Cultural Arts & Event Center, and the UW-Green Bay Radio GBX and Center for Games and Interactive Media. One grandparent told a Library staff member that they had been traveling with their grandchild to Manitowoc for art classes, and they were absolutely thrilled to hear about the offerings of the Boys & Girls Club and Urban Cultural Arts & Event Center that are much closer to home!

Ongoing partnerships with local businesses Gnome Games and Powers Comics also contributed to the success of this event. Gnome Games hosted a gaming area, including giant chess and checkers, and Powers Comics sold comics and memorabilia in the Artists' Alley.

The Library staff is incredibly grateful to the Friends for their ongoing support of Pop Con. This event continues to be a favorite of patrons and staff members alike.




